Illinois Launches New Quality Rating System for Early Care and Education

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ith the launch of the Quality Counts: Quality Rating System in July 2007, Illinois joined the growing number of states across the country implementing quality rating systems. A Quality Rating System (QRS) is a systemic approach to assess, improve, and communicate the level of quality in early care and education programs. Much like the rating systems used for restaurants and hotels, QRS award stars (or some other symbol) to recognize higher quality programs that meet defined program standards.

Currently there are 15 states (Colorado, District of Columbia, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Maryland, Montana, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Vermont) that have statewide Quality Rating Systems. Many more states are in the design or pilot stage of QRS development. Although the states with QRS may vary on the number of quality levels recognized or the specific quality criteria required, all Quality Rating Systems have criteria that address staff qualifications, training, and professional development.

QRS Common Elements

All Quality Rating Systems are composed of five common elements.

Program Standards

Standards for Quality Rating Systems are built on the foundation of child care licensing regulations. While licensing regulations provide the "floor" of minimum quality requirements, QRS provides the "ceiling" of higher quality standards, such as national accreditation or achieving minimum scores on reliable and valid measures of program quality. What makes QRS particularly useful as a quality improvement strategy is that it recognizes and rewards the multiple stair steps of quality needed to ascend from the floor to the ceiling.

Accountability Measures

Accountability measures and monitoring processes are used to determine how well programs meet QRS standards and to assign quality ratings.

Program and Practitioner Support

Training and technical assistance is provided to encourage program participation in QRS and to assist programs to attain higher levels of quality.

Financial Incentives

Programs that meet higher standards than licensing regulations and achieve a quality rating are eligible for financial incentives such as a tiered subsidy reimbursement (if they serve children from families that receive Child Care and Development Fund subsidies) or quality improvement grants.

Parent and Consumer Education

Most Quality Rating Systems award easily recognizable symbols, such as stars, to programs that indicate the level of program quality to parents and other consumers. One of the goals of the QRS is to better educate parents about quality components in early care and education and to assist them in making informed decisions when choosing a child care program.

Illinois Quality Counts: Quality Rating System

The Illinois Quality Counts: Quality Rating System was designed to support the state's early care and education programs in providing higher quality care for children and their families. The voluntary system is funded by the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) and is available to licensed programs as well as license-exempt family child care providers serving children eligible for the IDHS Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP).

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The system for licensed homes and centers consists of four progressive star levels, providing a continuum that sets clear benchmarks of quality. Specific quality criteria must be met to achieve each star level. Once these criteria have been met, the program will receive a quality add-on rate to the CCAP standard reimbursement rate of 5%, 10%, 15%, or 20%. The quality criteria relate to four areas of program standards: regulatory learning compliance, environment, program administration, and qualifications and training (see chart for licensed centers on page 3).

Implementing the System

IDHS is partnering with the Illinois Network of Child Care Resource and Referral Agencies (INCCRRA) and the McCormick Tribune Center for Early Childhood Leadership to implement this voluntary system. INCCRRA is responsible for the overall administration of the quality rating system. The McCormick Tribune Center for Early Childhood Leadership is responsible for providing on-site assessments of the learning environment of early childhood centers and family child care homes. The Center is also responsible for providing assessments of leadership and management practices in centers and business practices in family child care homes.

Getting Involved

The first step for those interested in learning more about Illinois Quality Counts: Quality Rating System is to attend a QRS orientation. QRS orientations are being offered by local child care resource and referral agencies. Proof of attendance at an "Introduction to the Environment Rating Scales (ERS)" training is also required for all licensed family child care and center providers applying for QRS.

The child care learning environment will be assessed using the environment rating scales at all star levels. These scales—Infant-Toddler Environment Rating Scale -Revised (ITERS-R), Early Childhood Environment Rating Scale - Revised (ECERS-R), School-Age Environment Rating Scale (SACERS), and the Family Child Care Environment Rating Scale -Revised (FCCERS-R)—were developed by Thelma Harms, Debby Crver, and Richard Clifford at the Frank Porter Graham Child Development Institute (FPG) at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. These tools have been extensively used in research and practice to improve the quality of the learning environment and interactions between children and teachers or providers.

At star levels three and four, administrative practices of homes and centers will be assessed. The *Program Administration Scale* (PAS), developed by Teri N. Talan and Paula J. Bloom, will be used to measure and improve the quality of leadership and management practices of center-based early care and education programs. The *Business Administration Scale for Family Child*

Care (BAS), developed by Drs. Talan and Bloom, will be used to measure and improve the quality of business and professional practices of family child care programs.

Staff from the McCormick Tribune Center for Early Childhood Leadership will be partnering with local child care resource and referral agencies throughout the state to provide "Getting Ready for the PAS" and "Getting Ready for the BAS" trainings. After completing these trainings, center administrators and family child care providers will have a

basic knowledge of these scales, be able to use the tools for program improvement, and know how to prepare for their PAS or BAS assessment.

National accreditation achieved from NAFCC, NAEYC, NECPA, NACCP, NAA will be recognized at the higher star levels. Validation by the Administration of Children and Families as in compliance with the Head Start Program Performance Standards (HSPPS) will also be accepted.

Computer Training for Early Childhood Administrators—Beginner Course

January 15, 29 and February 5, 12, 2008

Sessions convene from 8:30 A.M. - 12:30 P.M. each day.

Administering an effective and efficient early childhood program requires expertise in technology. Let us help you improve your computer skills and integrate technology into the management of your child care program. This beginner course, funded by the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS), consists of four hands-on training sessions as well as additional content and activities delivered online. For Illinois Director Credential (IDC) purposes, this training equals 28 contact hours or two IDC management competency points. Enrollment is limited and priority will be given to administrators whose programs serve IDHS-funded children.

Program Administration Scale Assessor Reliability Training January 28-31, 2008

The *Program Administration Scale* (PAS) measures leadership and management practices of center-based early care and education programs. Assessor reliability training includes an overview of reliability of the instrument, interview protocol for collecting data, and information on how to score indicators and items. Individuals who successfully complete the training are eligible to become certified PAS assessors.

This four-day training is designed for technical assistance specialists, quality monitors, management consultants, researchers, and other professionals interested in using the PAS to reliably assess early childhood leadership and management practices and help center directors improve the quality of their programs.

Family Child Care Institute-Program Quality Evaluation

February 29 - March 1 and May 17, 2008

Getting Ready for the PAS and BAS

Two of the assessment tools used in the new Illinois Quality Counts: Quality Rating System are the Program Administration Scale (PAS) and the Business Administration Scale for Family Child Care (BAS). For eligibility at star levels 3 or 4 in Illinois Quality Counts, a center administrator must participate in formal training on the PAS and the primary family home provider must take part in formal training on the BAS.

The Illinois Network of Resource and Referral Agencies is sponsoring a series of workshops over the next few months to help center administrators and child care home providers learn more about these assessment tools.

For child care center administrators, "Getting Ready for the PAS" provides an overview of the *Program Administration* Scale. The PAS is designed to measure the quality of leadership and management practices of center-based early childhood programs. After completing this training, providers will have a basic knowledge of the PAS, be able to use the tool for program selfimprovement, and know how to prepare for the PAS assessment.

For family child care providers, "Getting Ready for the BAS" provides overview of the Business Administration Scale for Family Child Care. The BAS is designed to assess the quality of management practices in the family child care setting. After completing this training, providers will have a basic knowledge of the BAS, be able to use the tool for program improvement, and know how to prepare for the BAS assessment.
